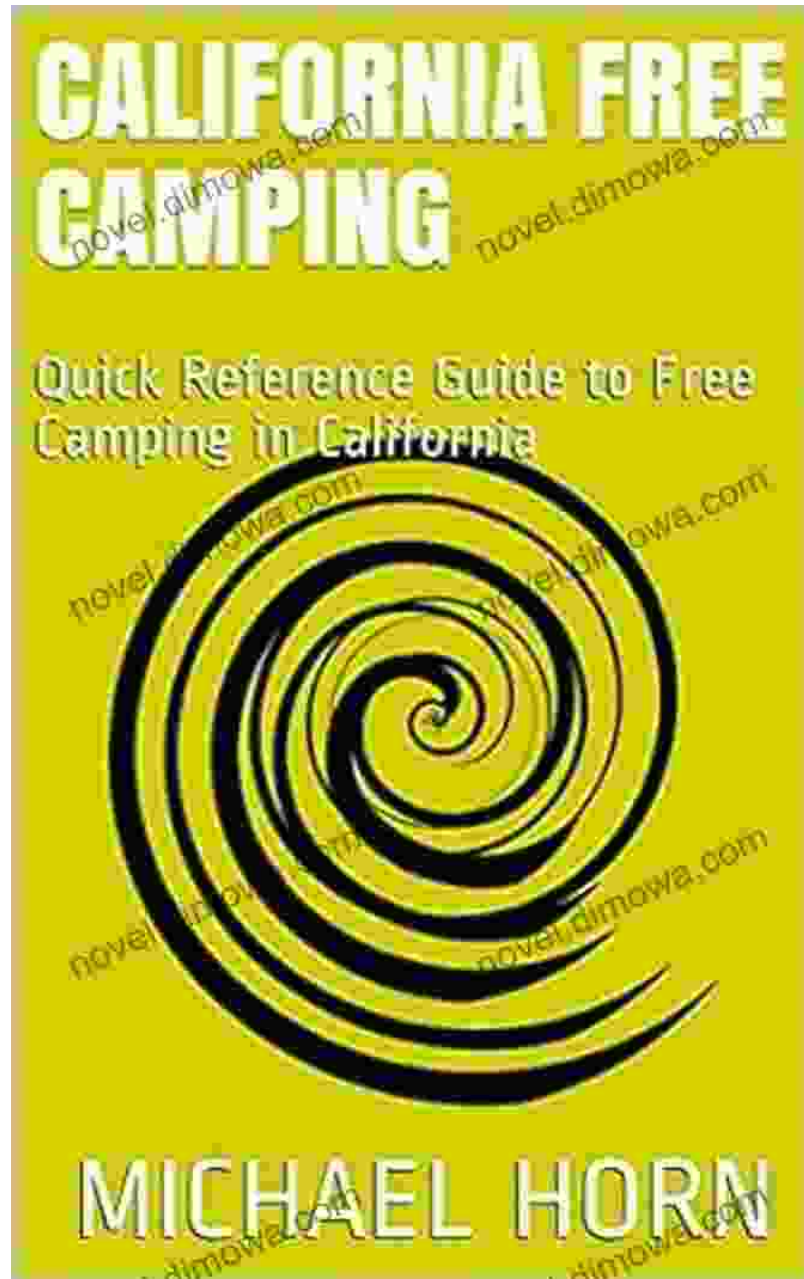

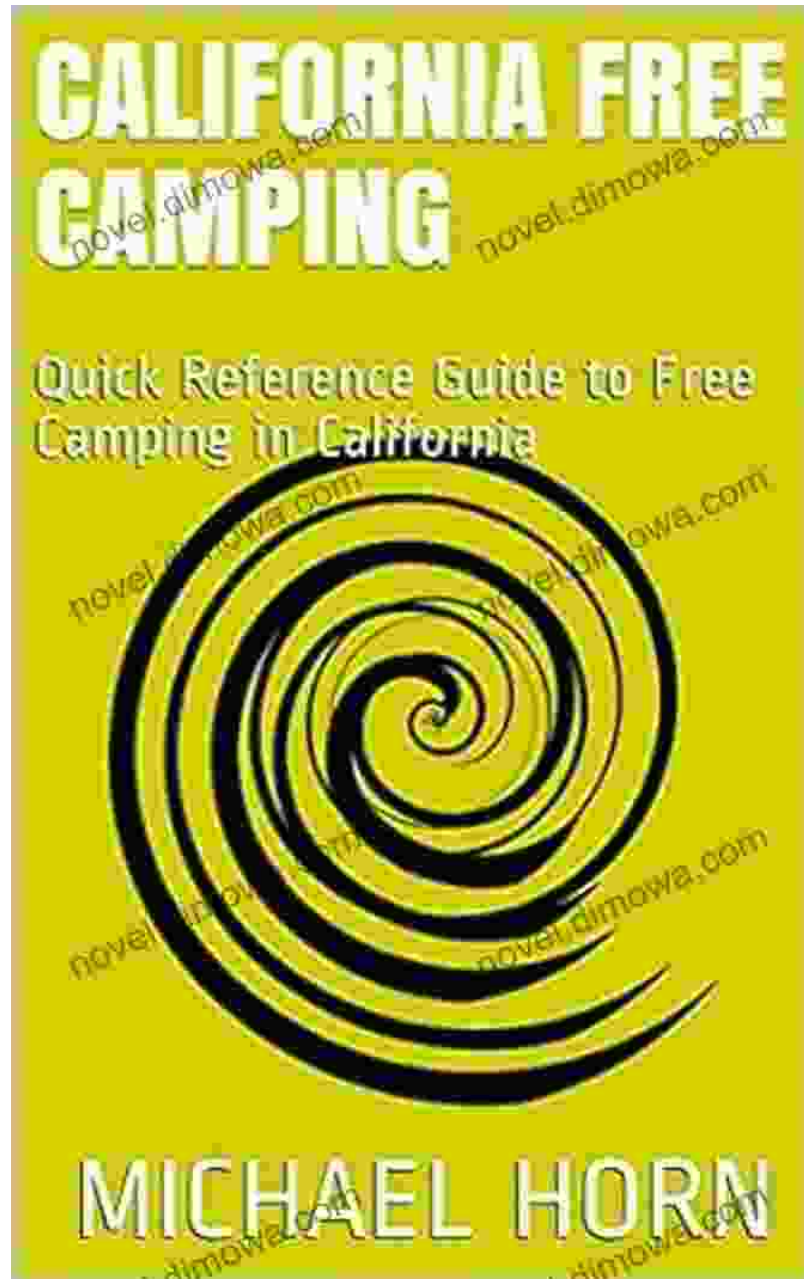

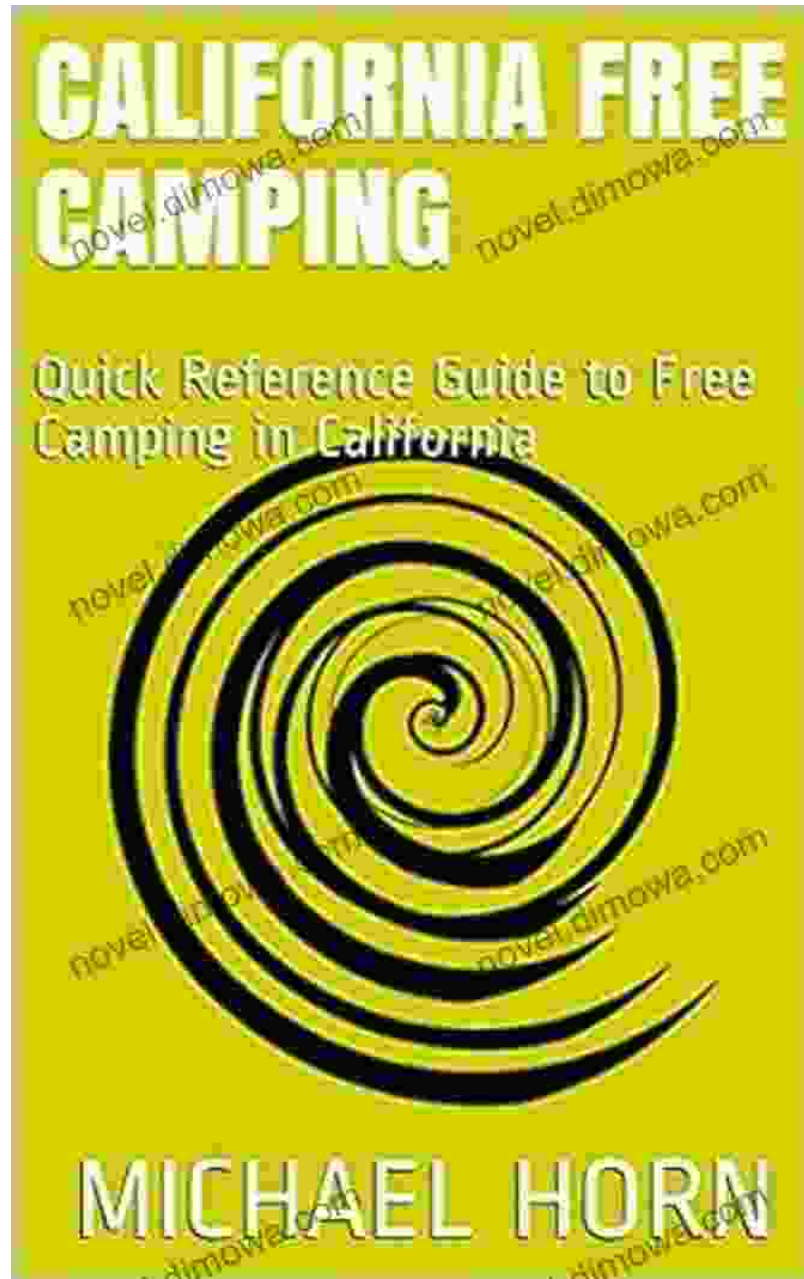

• HOW COMMON ARE CALIFORNIA WILDFIRES? •

At least 6,284 wildfires occurred in California in 2018, according to the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE). These fires burned approximately 876,147 acres of land.

• WHAT TO DO BEFORE A CALIFORNIA WILDFIRE •

 <p>Separate your home from flammable materials</p> <p>Clear up leaf litter and other debris before you go. Store flammable materials and equipment well away from your home.</p>	 <p>Trim trees and shrubs</p> <p>Trim trees and shrubs at least once a year. Remove any dead branches or limbs. Keep your house clear of any dead branches or limbs.</p>	 <p>Clean your home's roof</p> <p>Remove pine needles, leaves and other debris from your home's roof.</p>	 <p>Store combustible materials properly</p> <p>Store combustible materials in a fire-resistant container or approved storage facility.</p>	 <p>Pick up battery-operated flashlights and radios</p> <p>Keep battery-operated flashlights and radios with alkaline battery batteries or a spare battery for power in case of a power outage.</p>

 <p>Stay up to date</p> <p>Stay up to date on wildfire news by following local news outlets and emergency services.</p>	 <p>Set up hoses and water</p> <p>If possible, fill your water hoses and set up hoses around your home.</p>	 <p>Turn on the house lights</p> <p>Adjust the lights to help you see if there is smoke.</p>	 <p>Remove flammable drapes or curtains</p> <p>Take down flammable drapes or curtains in your home.</p>	 <p>Get ready to evacuate</p> <p>Prepare all family members and pets to evacuate your home.</p>

 <p>Contact local fire agencies</p> <p>Check on your neighbors and make sure they are safe to return home.</p>	 <p>Look for hot spots</p> <p>Check the ground for smoking embers and other fire hazards. Use a bucket of water to cool down any hot spots.</p>	 <p>Examine your home's exterior</p> <p>Look for sparks and embers around your home's roof and gutters.</p>	 <p>Evacuate your home's interior</p> <p>Keep smoke out of your home by closing doors and windows.</p>	 <p>Call 911</p> <p>Contact 911 if you see any potential hazards.</p>

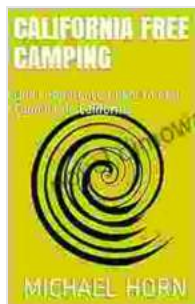

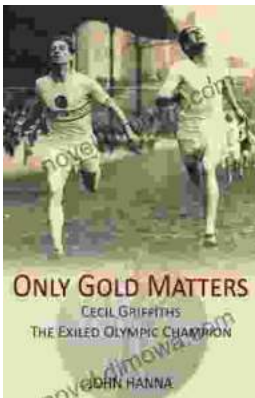
